GOVERNORS' REPORT TO PARENTS COVERING YEAR SEPTEMBER 2000 - JULY 2001

This report is issued under the terms of the Education Act 1986 and related Instruments which require school governors to report annually to parents. The report will be the subject of discussion at the Annual Meeting between governors and parents due to be held at 8.00 pm on Tuesday 19 February 2002 in Bader Hall.

1. **INTRODUCTION**

It gives me much pleasure on behalf of my fellow Governors to present the Annual Report for the school's academic year ending in July 2001.

The Report outlines the many activities that have again been offered to students and which are now becoming a regular part of the life of King Edward VI School. Trips abroad to places such as France, Belgium, Canada and Barbados. The numerous drama and music productions as well as public speaking and art exhibitions. Many visits were organised to different places in order to enhance the curriculum. A large number of the different sports offered lead to the opportunity for students to represent the District or the County.

As well as acknowledging the above, the school is again very proud of the examination achievements by students in all three Key Stages. The excellent Key Stage 3 SAT results. The improvement in GCSE and A Level examinations and the excellent results in Advanced GNVQ.

All the above could not be achieved without the very hard work of a very dedicated team of professionals. I would like to thank all staff, teaching and non-teaching, for their hard work and commitment to all the students in their care. I would also like to thank all parents for their support of the school and especially the work of a very committed Parent Teacher Association. This Association has again put in many hours of hard work in order to provide additional funds for the school.

2. **GOVERNORS' MEETINGS**

Meetings of the Full Governing Body were held on 5 October and 9 November 2000 and on 18 January, 29 March, 17 May and 5 July 2001.

In addition to the above, meetings also took place with regard to Target Setting as well as various Governors' Appointments Meetings.

3. <u>NUMBERS ON ROLL AND EXAMINATION RESULTS</u>

The number on roll in January 2001 was 1370. Details of attendance figures and public examination results are given in the appendices. We are delighted to report that our rates of attendance improved yet again this year (the fifth year of improvement in a row) and we have the highest attendance figures in the County.

'A' level results were very pleasing again. This was a large and successful year group with no fewer than 140 students taking at least 2 'A' levels. Three students achieved four grade A passes among their results and one student actually managed five grade A passes! These students are Sarah Henshaw, Helen Oginsky, Vanessa Skelton and Alexandra Jackson. Eleven further students achieved three A grades within their results – Alison Byard, Stephanie Dawson, Christopher Heald, Victoria Hollinshead, Helen McDonald, Allan Pengelly, Sarah Townsend, Louise Treherne, Gemma Turton, Rachel Tyler and Mary Wilcox.

It was also a record year for Advanced GNVQ success. Thirty students completed courses and 19 of them achieved "Distinctions". Candidates achieving Distinctions are Duncan Kain, Faye Shaw, Jason Walter, Emily Wassall (all Art and Design); Richard Brain, James Dodds, Carl Downie, Rookmanie Kanda, Asfa Kanum, Peter Westwood (all Business); Clare Barber, Melanie Bartlett, Rachel Brannan, Hannah Clarke, Helen Cooper, Barbara Jackson, Louise Jamieson, Louise Mackay, Rachel Sutton (all Health and Social Care).

Once again, two students from last year's Year 13 have secured Oxbridge places. They are Allan Pengelly and Alexandra Jackson. Allan has started already and Alex will begin in September 2002 after a 'gap' year. Many more students have secured university places too, or are progressing successfully to the next stage in their career.

At GCSE, 73% of the students in Year 11 achieved at least 5 grades A* to C. This is only the third time the school has ever achieved a figure in the 70s, all of them in the last four years, and is a credit to the year group. No fewer than 25 students achieved seven or more A or A* grades and five of these actually achieved A or A* in <u>all</u> of the subjects that they studied. They are Jennifer Allcock, Richard Bateman, Joanna Heald, Hannah Jones and Sophie Morton.

Key Stage 3 results for English, Mathematics and Science tests taken by Year 9 last year accounted for our best performance for four years. We wish these students, who are now in Year 10, well for their Key Stage 4 studies where hard work can bring further successes.

Congratulations to all students who have done so well this year.

Details of the further education/employment destinations of students leaving in July 2000 are given in the appendix information.

4. <u>ACTIVITIES AND STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS</u>

Once again, we have provided a wide range of activities for students. As for links with our community, our facilities continue to be used by a variety of groups and clubs. Staff and students continue to contribute to many events within Lichfield. We are represented on local committees and the Youth Forum. It is a pleasure to be able to report that last year one of our students, Jackie Fowler, won the Lions International UK Award for Services to the Community. The Parent Teacher Association ran a number of successful events, again, for the benefit both of school and the community. Equally, students in school continued to raise money for charities, many of them local ones, and £2,800 was achieved altogether. This was an increase of about £400 on the previous year.

There is a wide range of school trips available. Many are one-day excursions but others are longer residential opportunities and exchanges. Our girls' sports tour to Barbados was a particular highlight and the Ski Trip to Canada was successful again. Other memorable excursions abroad last year included the Year 7 languages visit to France; the Year 10 Battlefields visit to Belgium and France; and both the Music and Art staff arranged trips to Paris. Year 12 also visited Paris as a study occasion

in February with regard to Design Technology and Business Studies. These, and other trips, enrich the work that we do and are wonderful opportunities for students. They also keep us very busy.

In helping me to compile this part of the report, various members of staff have contributed the following:

- i) <u>Sport</u> The school aims to provide a broad range of sporting activities for all students. In consequence, there is a very wide range of activities within our PE lessons. In addition to this, students are also involved in many team and sometimes individual events. (Please see Appendix 6a and 6b for details of team events and sporting achievements.)
- ii) <u>Music</u> The Music Department has been busy again and contributed very effectively to the annual Carol Concert in Lichfield Cathedral. In the Spring Term there was a successful Music Concert with contributions from many of our groups. the annual musical this year was "Annie" and it was a triumph again. A hard working team of students and staff were led by Mrs Reeves, Mrs Wright and Mrs Brannan. Our thanks in particular, this year, to Mrs Reeves who retired in August her contributions over the years to our musicals has been remarkable to say the least! We will miss Mrs Reeves, but the show must go on. In the Summer Term we had another successful concert, our musicians contributed to many County events, and Mrs Brannan coordinated the music tour to Paris.

Instrumental teaching has continued, involving about 100 students last year, and many took Associated Board examinations, supported by the school. Further details of students' musical achievements are given in Appendix 7.

<u>Drama and Public Speaking</u> Once again it has been a busy year at King Edward VI School with outstanding dramatic works of art performed.

The House Drama Competition provided Key Stage 3 students with the chance to perform on stage and offered the Sixth Form many challenges not only in directing but also in set design, costume, lighting, sound and choreography to which they rose admirably. This year all four Houses produced top quality performances, showing both creativity and practical awareness.

A night to remember was the Sixth Form Revue led by Mrs Wright and Miss Dyson and great fun was had by all producing sketches and performing in this marvellous event.

The Theatre Studies groups reached their best ever results in the A Level performance with half of the class achieving grade A. The group performed a series of monologues and duologues and showed their devised pieces; one based upon the theme of bullying and another telling the story of Marjory Evans, the last woman to be burnt at the stake in Lichfield.

Hot on the heels of these exams were the new AS Level performances. The group had chosen to perform 'Blood Brothers' and this was a fantastic evening with many of the audience overwhelmed by the talent of the students.

Many theatre trips were undertaken including a visit to the National Theatre to see Simon Russell Beale as 'Hamlet' and to the Oxford Playhouse to see the radical new production of '1984'.

Again, the Public Speaking Competition was both a great challenge and a great success with many lively and entertaining speeches being delivered.

<u>Art</u> Our Annual Musical and Sixth Form Review gave staff and students opportunities for set, design, painting and constructing, costume design and choreography. An Arts trip to Paris took place in July and was a huge success again. Art GNVQ students in Year 13 also put together another five exhibitions in the centre of Lichfield which received many visitors and lots of positive feedback.

<u>Duke of Edinburgh Awards</u> This year nineteen Year 10 pupils have started their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award. The majority have just had their final expedition to complete then they will have completed their Bronze Award and will register for their Silver Award. In November 2001 four of our past pupils: Caroline Ayerst, Beverley Handley, Michelle Tunningley and Tracy Underhill attended the Gold Award presentation at St James' Palace.

5. **<u>FINANCE</u>**

Details of the Delegated Budget for 2000/2001, the Covenant Scheme, Parent Teacher Association Gifts and the School Fund are given in Appendix 4.

I would wish to express my appreciation to Mr Sutton, Mrs Dennis and Mrs Cook for the tremendous work that they have done once again. Our funds are very well managed and this is confirmed time after time by auditors and of course by our own experiences.

As we know, Staffordshire is very poorly funded compared with most other counties. The budget this year was particularly disappointing and was made slightly more difficult still because of the slight decrease in our numbers in the Sixth Form. We were able to increase our level of staffing slightly, however, but this was partly achieved by using what little reserves that we had and by the fact that we did not increase the amount given to Departments to spend on textbooks.

We have also been able to continue our premises improvements partly from our own resources but largely because we have continued to be successful in gaining County support for some of the improvements that we needed to make.

6. **PREMISES**

The importance of improving our premises and facilities continues to be a priority for Governors. Further general redecoration has continued in a number of areas as part of our rolling programme.

In the Science Department three further laboratories have been completely refurbished. These are H10, 32 and 33 which are now much better facilities than they were. The first phase of our planned improvements to the Technology building was also initiated over the summer. This is also a big improvement but does need to be followed up in the next summer break to come. Unfortunately, these jobs were not entirely finished when September arrived and so there was an element of disruption and inconvenience at first. Although this is certainly a shame, we know that the improvements will be well worth it in the end.

The development of our King's Hill House resource is already having a supportive and positive benefit for a number of students and staff.

The swimming pool was also redecorated this year and the longstanding problems regarding inadequate ventilation in the pool area has been addressed at the same time. This whole process involved a careful draining and refilling of the pool and this was completed during September 2001.

The improvements to Bader Reception and the office have made a big difference to the entrance to that part of our school. This has been complemented by the improved disabled access nearby. It has also been possible to make some improvements within staff workrooms as a result of a grant for which we successfully applied for precisely this purpose.

Our pavilion has been completely refurbished and electricity has been connected to the building. The improvements here were very much needed and credit should go to the School Council for their keen

interest in raising the priority of this project. Financial support came from the PTA, the Swinfen Broun Trust and a Seed Challenge Grant for which we applied successfully.

Perimeter fencing, gates, CCTV, and tennis court fencing have all helped the security of the site. The Johnson Bank has also been rebuilt and strengthened and is in the process of being replanted.

7. <u>SECURITY</u>

Further progress has been made in implementing the recommendations of the Security Review carried out two years ago.

New lighting has been installed covering the Bader car park. New railings have been placed on the wall at the Upper St John Street entrance and new higher gates have been installed. A substantial amount of perimeter fencing has been installed around the Bader site.

A CCTV system is now in place giving very wide protection across the whole site.

The combined effect of all of these improvements has been to reduce the amount of vandalism enormously. The site is now much more secure from unwelcome visitors at all times of day.

8. CURRICULUM MATTERS

Our review of curriculum provision has continued and we have particularly needed to pay attention to work involving the introduction of the new Sixth Form courses of AS, A2 and VCE. This has involved much hard work and a change to many of the routines for staff and for Sixth Formers. We have also been making preparations for the introduction of Information Technology as a VCE course and we are delighted to say that this has been a popular move for September 2001.

Preparations at Key Stage 4 for the revised GCSEs were also a concern for Departments and our new Year 10 students have started these. At Key Stage 3 one of the main priorities last year was the preparation for the implementation of the National Key Stage 3 Strategy.

GCSE targets set two years ago for the summer of 2001 were largely met. These had been based on the record of that year group at that stage. The target of 68% achieving 5 A*-C was well surpassed as we achieved 73%. The average points score for the year set at 46.0 was met. We achieved 46.1. We had hoped to achieve 99% as the figure for students achieving at least one GCSE but unfortunately we only managed 98% this year. Small numbers or movements of students can affect this figure adversely. We will be looking carefully at this target for next year, although, in recognition that other indications are more significant, the Government is scrapping that particular measure from next year. Nevertheless, this all represents a strong performance.

Evidence regarding the current Year 11 would suggest that they appear to be on course for success. After due consideration, Governors amended their targets to 73% 5 A*-C; 99% 1 A*-G; 47.0 average points, in our expectation of another strong performance in 2002.

New targets for 2002 and beyond are as follows:

We are hoping that our current Year 9 will have tremendous success when they take their Key Stage 3 tests in 2002. Our target is for 90% to achieve Level 5 in English, and then 89% is the corresponding figure in Maths and Science.

We are hoping that our current Year 8 will then be able to develop from this strong position and in 2003 achieve 91% in English and 90% in both Maths and Science.

This is the first time that we have had to set formal targets in these areas, although we have obviously been working to improve in these areas anyway.

Our current Year 10 who did so well in Key Stage 3 will have to keep up the good work because we are hoping that they will perform equally well at Key Stage 4. We have set a target of 74% to achieve

at least 5 A*-C with an average points score of 47.0. The newly defined target of at least 5A*-G, which must include both English and Maths in all cases, has been set at 96%.

These are all challenging targets but they are also ones that we believe are feasible and which, if achieved, would represent a very pleasing level of success.

9. PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT UNDERTAKEN BY TEACHING STAFF

The academic year 2000/2001 saw the school complete its second three-year term as an Investors in People school, an award which we continue to hold in recognition of our commitment to the training and professional development of all staff. During the year another very full programme of professional development activities linked closely to the school's development priorities was carried out by both teaching and non-teaching staff.

For teachers, six days were allowed during the year where students were not required to attend school and which were, therefore, available for professional development activities. Details of how these days were used are given below. Planning for the days reflects the high priority placed in the school's development plan upon ensuring progress in our work to improve further the quality of teaching and learning and upon the introduction of a performance management system for all teaching staff. We are now well on the way to introducing a system of performance management for non-teaching staff during the current year.

4th September 2000 A day of planning meetings and information sessions to allow staff final preparation time for the start of the new school year.

30th January 2001 The day consisted of workshops on two development priorities:

- Interviewing skills for performance management.
- The use of value-added data.

14th February 2001 A day given over entirely to a first round of performance management meetings involving all teaching staff.

5th and 6th April 2001 Two days at the end of the spring term in which individual subject departments had the opportunity to work on their own particular needs and priorities, relating these to whole-school issues where appropriate.

 2^{nd} July 2001 This day formed part of the school's strategy for Information and Communications Technology training. Most teaching staff were able to complete the training programme in out-of-school time earlier in the year. Others worked through the programme on the day itself.

For several years now professional development for all staff in Information and Communications Technology (ICT) has been a high priority for the school and this remained a focus. In addition to the training day mentioned above and post-school training sessions which were available to all staff, most departments also embarked upon the centrally-funded New Opportunities Scheme (NOF) which is designed to give all teachers the opportunity to develop their skills in Information and Communications Technology to the standard which is now expected of all newly qualified teachers. It is planned that all staff will have completed this programme by September 2002. It is pleasing to report also that in the course of the last two years no fewer than twenty staff have gained additional qualifications in ICT.

Other main areas of focus for professional development during the year included:

- Further progress by a small number of staff towards the completion of MA or MSc degrees with either Loughborough or Manchester Metropolitan University.
- A full induction programme for all newly qualified teachers who joined the school in September 2000.
- The completion by two members of the senior management team of the National Professional Qualification for Headship (NPQH).

- Professional development to support the introduction of new courses at Key Stage 4 and in the Sixth Form.
- Opportunities for key staff to prepare for the introduction of new strategies in literacy and numeracy at Key Stage 3.
- Training in new UCAS procedures for all sixth-form tutors.
- An increase in the range and scope of professional development opportunities available to non-teaching staff.
- An introductory course in counselling skills for seventeen staff (teachers and learning support assistants).

In addition to the above, further training and professional development was arranged throughout the year in response to priorities which were identified at whole-school, departmental and individual level. Full computerised records are kept of these activities and each is evaluated by the member of staff taking part. This helps with future planning.

10. SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

A new policy on Special Educational Needs was written during the last academic year and ratified by Governors on 5 July 2001. Amongst other changes the new policy makes reference to new legislation on disability and issues of social inclusion. It will be necessary to review the policy again during this year.

There have been significant changes during the year both in personnel and the basis on which staff in the Department of Learning Support are employed. In September the funding from the LEA, for students with Statements, was devolved directly to school for the first time. This has enabled us to offer both Learning Support Assistants (LSAs) and Special Educational Needs Support Service (SENSS) tutors permanent contracts with the school.

There are currently 42 students with statements and a further 86 on the Special Needs Register but without statements.

This year we have introduced the Government Progress Units in Literacy as part of our teaching programme. These are delivered to Year 7 students in early morning teaching sessions and lunchtimes and to Year 8 students during one lesson per week on a rota system. Year 9 teaching continues to be delivered to selected students rather than their German lessons.

The conversion of one of the houses in the school grounds has provided us with an ideal teaching base for the Learning Support Department. King's Hill House is an excellent resource and is used for both individual and group teaching. Students are also beginning to use it as a drop-in facility at break or lunchtimes. A gardening club has also been introduced, run by Year 12 students ably guided by Mrs Collin, one of our tutors. We are also beginning to make more use of Year 12 students as a resource for supporting our younger students both in class and as paired readers.

We continue to benefit from the support of SENSS, who this year have appointed a Behaviour Support Specialist, Mrs Woffinden, who has come into school and worked very profitably both with individual students and with a group of Year 7 students. Mrs Mansell from SENSS has continued to work with students and provide exam dispensation reports. The LEA Educational Psychologist, Mrs Nelson, comes in on a regular basis. The input of an Educational Psychologist is much valued and we have increased the support by employing another Educational Psychologist, Mr Mawer, on a consultancy basis using social inclusion funding. Both Educational Psychologists meet together regularly with key members of staff to plan and co-ordinate their work.

The Social Inclusion Programme run in conjunction with Stowe Teaching Unit and other secondary schools in Lichfield has proved very successful and has allowed a number of students to spend differing periods of time in a small teaching unit and working closely with specialist staff before returning to King Edward VI. The project was a runner-up for the LEA's Andrew Pointon Award, a special award given annually by the LEA to recognise schools which show outstanding commitment to the welfare of students. The Stowe project and the further development of multi-agency Pastoral Support Plans have contributed significantly to our success in reducing student exclusions during the

past academic year and have enabled students to remain in school successfully until the end of their compulsory education.

We continue to maintain contacts with local special schools. Two students from Rocklands School attend Year 8 drama lessons once per week. It saddens us that the school campus does not easily lend itself to disabled access. A new access has been built at the back of the restaurant to enable wheelchair users to access Bader Hall. Links with Saxon Hill School are being rekindled this year and we hope that students from King Edward VI will participate in lunchtime activities with students from Saxon Hill. It is hoped that this will create links so that students from Saxon Hill can begin to use our facilities more easily.

This is helping us to build a very strong team to support and teach those students who are experiencing difficulties with both learning and/ or behaviour.

11. <u>ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS AND ACCESS FACILITIES PROVIDED TO ASSIST</u> <u>STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES</u>

It is a regrettable fact that a considerable part of the school remains inaccessible to wheelchair users and others unable to use staircases. Although the LEA has funds to provide disabled access for students in schools, its policy is to identify and target one school in each district for the provision of access facilities. Unfortunately, King Edward VI School is not the identified school in this district.

However, the newest classroom block (Q-block) is on a single floor, has ramped access and a disabled person's toilet. In addition, there is a hoist in the swimming pool to assist students and adults with disabilities getting in and out of the water.

Most recently, we have made alterations to the entrance to Bader Hall and the restaurant, with a level path and doorway to the rear, so that wheelchair users are now able to access the building much more easily.

12. <u>SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT PLAN/GOVERNORS' ACTION PLAN</u>

The School Development Plan was updated during the year and Governors have also been considering more long-term strategic issues as we prepare to renew our strategic planning documentation.

A great deal of planning work goes on during the year but the following points are particularly worthy of mention:

- (i) Momentum has been maintained regarding site improvements despite the disappointing budget. This has largely been the result of some separate funding from County and our own initiatives in seeking extra funds.
- (ii) Staff training has continued successfully and we have made a positive start with new Performance Management arrangements.
- (iii) A number of our policies have been reviewed or updated during the year and some new ones have been created. Work has involved the updating of: Health and Safety, Special Educational Needs and Health Education. Two new policies ratified by Governors are Complaints Procedures and Performance Management.
- (iv) We have continued to develop the School Council and our prefect system has been completely revised.
- (v) Guidance to students has been boosted by the adoption of more opportunities for individual interviews at crucial stages when decisions have to be taken, particularly during Years 9 and 11.
- (vi) Our Learning Support Department has continued to expand and its facilities are improving.

13. CONCLUSION

I hope having read this report you will agree that King Edward VI School has again had a successful year and is continuing to progress in the right direction.
